



FR." is presented at the base of the postmark like the format used for the HAIPHONG A SAIGON PAQ. FR. type 2.006 postmark.

Paquebot Tourane

Tourane was a port regularly visited by ships that provided the coastal mail service. When taken ashore, mail posted aboard the boats was handstamped with the rectangular framed "PAQUEBOT."

After being handled by the coastal mail service, this postcard was taken to France by the ocean mail service. The postcard was carried by the *Polynésien*, which departed Saigon on 2 October 1909.







PAQUEBOT Port Said

This letter was mailed aboard a ship lacking a post office by a member of the Tonkin Expeditionary Corps on his way to Indochina. Likely the mailing was taken ashore at Port Said, Egypt and was put on a ship returning to France. Arriving at Marseilles it was handstamped with the straight-line "PAQUEBOT" in accordance with Universal Postal Union regulations in effect since 1892. Even though the cover lacked the requisite military markings that certified its free mail status, it was accepted postage-free into the French mail system.



Mailed from Hanoi on 28 September 1906, this postcard was addressed to a passenger on the Messageries Maritimes ship leaving Marseilles on 28 October. When the postcard reached Port Said, Egypt, it was held awaiting the arrival of the next ship. The two Port Said postmarks indicate that the postcard was held from at least 24 October to 11 December. By the purser's cachets, several ships had accepted the postcard. However, they were unable to locate the addressee. Ultimately, the postcard was redirected to Hanoi with large red letters overwritten on the address.





Multiple purser's markings appear on a cover that made its way from ship to ship in search of the addressee. Examples on this envelope are from: *Polynésien*, *Sydney*, *Yarra*, *Australien*, *Iraquaddy*, *Annam* and *Ernest Simons*.





Dr. Hanson's Letter

This cover was in transit from August 1908 until April 1909 during which time it received over twenty handstamped and manuscript markings. The envelope was addressed to Monsieur Hanson "medicine de 1^{ere} classe de la Marine" (doctor first class of the Navy) aboard the paquebot Sydney at Columbo, Ceylon.

The cover moved from ship to ship when they encountered one another in various ports. The administrative officers of the ships applied their individual ship's markings as a way of signaling "not here" and avoid getting the same letter again.

Five of the ships noted on the cover (*Sydney*, *Yarra*, *Salazie*, *Ville de la Ciotat* and *Calédonien*) were part of a seven-ship grouping organized for the opening of the Australian Line.




