Eagles Use of 1 and 5 centimes

Low values were mainly used for mundane mail like this printed advertising circular from 1868. Unlike the stamps on letters, stamps on printed matter and the like were canceled with dated postmarks.

From 1862 through 1871, the postage rate for military letters was 20 centimes. The military post offices applied octagonal postmarks to certify that the sender qualified for the reduced rate.

In addition to the CCH lozenges, there also existed lozenges with the letters "CCN" followed by a numeral. Lozenge CCN2 was assigned to Bien-Hoa where it was used starting in 1863.

A military postmark and the framed "PD" handstamp attest to the fact that this mailing qualified for the reduced military rate of 20 centimes

While postmarks provided information about the time and place of posting, postage stamps were canceled with CCH lozenge to prevent their reuse. If stamps escaped cancellation at the origin, they were sometimes canceled during transit as in the case of this letter with the number 1643 lozenge.

Postage for a second step (7½ to 15 grams) letter posted at the military rate from Saigon to Paris in 1868 was paid with a strip of four 10-centime Eagle stamps. The reverse bears a circular cachet with the inscription "Inspection de Tan-An Cochinchine" surrounding an imperial eagle. Transit time was approximately six weeks.

Circular 270 of November 1862 specified that letters sent from the Far East to Europe via the British services at Suez were to be charged 70 centimes per 7½ grams. Here a pair and an "L-shaped" block of five 10-centime Eagle stamps paid the postage for a mailing posted at Saigon on 7 January 1865 that arrived at Paris on 27 February, a total travel time of 52 days.



From 1862 through 1871, the civilian letter rate was 50 centimes. As no 50-centime stamp was issued as part of the Eagles series, senders typically used combinations of lower values to compose the required postage.



The same postage rates applied to France and her colonies. In this case, 50 centimes worth of postage was accepted for a letter posted from Saigon to Saint Denis, Reunion in 1867.

Eagles Use of 10, 20 and 40 centimes

Effective 1 January 1864, postage rates were adjusted by the nationality of the ship carrying the mail. Franked letters sent to France via English ships were charged 70 centimes per 10 grams. Here the three color franking for a mailing in 1868 was composed of single examples of 10, 20 and 40-centime Eagles.

When new postage rates were put into effect on 1 January 1864, the basic weight step was 10 grams. Regular letters were charged 70 centimes for transit on English ships. Postage for this example of a double-weight letter was paid with two 10–centime stamps and three 40–centime Eagle stamps.

Because the military letter rate to France was 20 centimes from 1862 to 1871, the 20–centime Eagle was commonly put into service on soldiers' mail. The rate was only applicable to letters carried on French ships. This cover was clearly marked "voie française" at the upper left.

Outside of Saigon, post offices used coded lozenges that corresponded to specific areas. Lozenge CCN3 served Mytho from 1864 through 1875. The CCH lozenge was used concurrently with the CCN3 lozenge during a portion of this time period.



An 80-centime Eagle paid the postage for a commercial letter posted from Saigon to Port Louis, Mauritius in 1868. Inside, the folded letter is datelined 29 March 1868.

The sender provided the routing instruction "Messageries Imperiales" so that the mailing would be transported from the Far East by French ship rather than the more expensive option via a British ship.

A block of four 80-centime Eagles vastly overpaid the local letter rate in 1879. A postmark with primitive spellings ("TONG-KIN" and "HAI-PHUNG") canceled the stamps. Created in 1876 when the Haiphong post office first opened, this device was quickly replaced with ones having more modern spellings. However, when the newer postmarking devices had worn out, the older postmark was temporarily put back into service during April and May of 1879.
